NIC WAS THE UNDOING OF HUGH'S FEARS

NICOLE Kidman has revealed she had to "beg" Hugh Grant not to quit acting and to join the cast of her hotly-anticipated new TV drama series.

The Oscar winner told The Sunday Mail she kept crossing paths with the Notting Hill and Four Weddings and a Funeral star but had to convince him he had the talent for a serious role in The Undoing, after being type cast as the foppish leading man in romantic comedies.

Kidman plays a psychologist who discovers her marriage to Grant is not as it seemed in the series set to stream this month on BINGE.

"He always says, 'Oh, I don't like working, I don't want to act'. He's one of those. But then when he works, you watch him and you go, 'You cannot stop, you're too good'," she said.

Kidman said Grant would stun many with his performance in the thriller by David E. Kelley, the man behind Big Little Lies.

"He's (Grant) mining places now with his life experience that are really extraordinary. He's very bold and willing to play such a diverse range of characters now."

While Kidman shared the screen for her latest TV project with the British star, she takes the spotlight on her own, on the cover of marie claire Australia — on sale

Sporting her trademark curls, first made famous in BMX Bandits, the working mum told the magazine she was relishing "the simple life" back home – with husband Keith and their two daughters, Sunday and Faith.

The family quarantined at their Southern Highlands home in June, before making a new "camp" in Byron Bay, where Kidman is filming Nine Perfect Strangers, alongside Offspring favourite Asher Keddie and Melissa McCar-

Bringing the production to Australia has been a proud moment for Kidman.

"I've had a lot of sleepless nights, there's been a lot of stress this year, but we're making it work with protocols and limitations. I still can't believe we did it. And to have the opportunity to give jobs to 1400 people... is such a joy for me, personally."

CHILDREN younger than 10 are being counselled for anxiety and hopelessness by their local general practitioners as there is a six month wait to see a psychiatric professional.

The Sunday Mail can reveal there are only 50 child and adolescent psychiatrists currently practising throughout Queensland at a time when the COVID-19 pandemic has increased demand for services and suicides are predicted to soar.

The Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists Queensland confirms there is a shortage of mental health professionals and is desperately trying to recruit more into the specialty of child psychiatry.

"I would suspect that there are children and adolescents dying on the waiting list and it is an awful situation for GPs to feel responsible for kids who need help and are impulsive and could commit suicide," the Queensland chair of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners Dr Bruce Gillett said. As new modelling predicts catastrophic levels of youth suicide sparked by COVID-19, Dr Gillett believes some of the Federal Government's \$48.1m cash injection for mental health support in the wake of the pandemic should be allocated to the training of GPs in the psych

"Our doctors need to be trained in how to help these struggling kids as prescribing medications is not the way we like to go with young people," he said. While most of the state's facilities have a waiting list some have closed their

doors to new patients as they are at their limit. The modelling from University of Sydney's Brain and Mind Centre shows the pandemic will contribute to a 30 per cent spike in teens taking their lives.

Experts have already predicted that the suicide rate in Australia will be 10 times higher than the number of deaths caused by the virus.

The current data shows the impact on children and adolescents. Kids Helpline shows there is a call for help to the Kids Helpline every 69 seconds and since March there has been almost 40 per cent increase in counselling on last year. "In our pre-Budget submission to the Oueensland Government, earlier this year, we asked them to commit to a target of 80 per cent of the National Mental Health Framework funding in community mental health services by 2024 at a rate of 5 per cent per year," a RANZCP Queensland Queensland spokeswoman said.

LIVE Aussie rules games have proved a success for Queensland, with almost 30 per cent more viewers tuning in to watch the Brisbane Lions make the preliminary final on Friday night (left).

With no Queensland teams in the finals for the NRL, the Brisbane Lions have become a shining light for Queensland sport fans. In Sydney 40,382 tuned in to the AFL, while 290,450 watched the NRL and Melbourne 520,908 watched the AFL and 19,968 watched the NRL.
